MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN

Thank you to the Aurora community for supporting the Town's waste diversion efforts. Your continued participation makes a difference in our Town and helps preserve Aurora's natural environment.

Browse through the following pages to learn about your waste, recycling and yard waste pick up schedules and don't forget to download the Recycle Coach app for android or IOS that will provide you with a personalized collection schedule, waste collection reminders, a what-goes-where search tool and more.

In an effort to help divert waste from landfills and to assist those who may have more garbage over the three-bag limit, the Town of Aurora is implementing a new bag tag program. Effective January 1, 2022, Aurora residents can place up to three-bags or containers out for pick up every other week on their regularly scheduled collection days and can purchase bag tags for additional waste up to a maximum of three (3) bags.

Bulky items such as furniture, mattresses, box springs, plastic lawn furniture, toilets (separated) and carpeting do not require a tag. (Up to five (5) items maximum).

Bag tags can be purchased for \$5 each tax included at Aurora Town Hall (100 John West Way). Waste beyond the three-bag limit will not be collected unless a bag tag sticker is placed around the neck of the bag. Residents can put up to a maximum of six (6) bags/bins of garbage out, three (3) free and three (3) paid. For more information on the Bag Tag Program visit aurora.ca/wasteandrecycling.

Aurora also offers many waste events annually to assist residents who want to dispose of old electronics and housewares. In 2022, residents will have the opportunity to participate in three E-waste events at the Joint Operations Centre on January 22, May 8 and October 22 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Residents are also encouraged to participate in the Curbside Giveaway Days where you can place unwanted items at the curb marked **free** for others to take. This event runs once a month from April to October.

Garbage Collection

Garbage collection occurs bi-weekly on your regular collection day.

- Waste materials must be set out at the **curb by** 7 a.m. on your collection day. Collection vehicles will not return for items that were set out late.
- Up to three (3) garbage bags or reusable containers with contents can be set out.
- More than three (3) garbage bags or reusable containers with contents require a bag tag. Up to a total of six (6) maximum three (3) without tags and three (3) with tags.
- Garbage bags or reusable containers with contents must not exceed 23 kg (50 lb).
- Garbage containers cannot exceed 133 litres (35 gal).
- Loose items must be tied into bundles no longer than 1.2 m (4 ft). Small furniture pieces must be tied and bundled as well.
- Loose materials such as wrappers, plastic bags, broken toys and foam containers must be placed in bags.
- Garbage will not be collected in cardboard boxes.



Glass and Other Sharp Objects

Every year, collection personnel are injured due to broken glass and sharp objects that are not packed properly. Help keep our workers safe and pack these items in a sealed cardboard box clearly labelled **Broken Glass or Sharp Object**. Set out the box with your regular garbage collection.

REMINDERS:

Please note: For safety reasons, residents are not permitted to put items into the collection vehicles.



Bag Tag Program

Starting January 1, 2022 the Town of Aurora will implement a new Bag Tag Program. Aurora residents can place up to three (3) bags



or containers out for pick up every other week on their regularly scheduled collection days. Any additional waste will require a bag tag.

Bulky items such as furniture, mattresses, box springs, plastic lawn furniture, toilets (separated) and carpeting do not require a tag. (Up to five (5) items maximum).

Bag tags can be purchased for \$5 each tax included at Aurora Town Hall (100 John West Way) starting mid-December.

Overflow of Garbage

Please do not overflow your garbage bags or reusable containers. Garbage bags or reusable containers with contents that exceed 23 kg (50 lb) will be left at the curb.



Textile Collection

We continue our efforts in diverting textiles from landfill, through an ongoing partnership with **Diabetes Canada** and **Cornerstone to Recovery**.

You will find bins around Town to donate clothing and textiles. Stained or torn textiles are also accepted, however, donated textiles must be dry and free of any medical or hazardous liquids.

Drop off your donations at one of the bins, or schedule a free home pick up at **declutter.diabetes.ca**.



Aurora's Textile Collection Program

Thank you to all residents for participating in Aurora's Textile Collection Program. Since the program started over **577,943 lb.** of textiles have been collected.

Textiles including used clothing, sheets, towels and fabrics make up five per cent of what gets thrown away as garbage from households in York Region.

Residents can dispose of unwanted clothing and textiles in collection bins at the following locations:

- Aurora Family Leisure Complex, 135 Industrial Parkway North Rear parking lot at the northwest corner

Recycling Collection

Blue Box collection occurs weekly on your regular collection day.

Blue Box reminders:

- Place acceptable materials in your Blue Box. Remove grease, liquid and food from containers before placing in the Blue Box.
- Blue Boxes must be set out at the **curb by 7 a.m. on your collection day, but no sooner than 5 p.m. the night before.** Collection vehicles will not return for items set out late.
- Use a standard size Blue Box with a regular container weight limit of 22 kg (50 lb). Large oversized containers (with or without wheels) are not accepted.
- Recyclables will not be collected in any type of plastic bag.
- Small recyclable boxes need to be flattened and securely placed inside the Blue Box. Large cardboard items must be flattened and bundled and no longer than 4 ft. in length. The recommended size for flattened cardboard is 4' x 4' x 4'.
- If you have large quantities of cardboard and are unable to tie and bundle it, please dispose at one of York Region's Waste Depots.
- Shredded paper is not accepted for pick up in the Blue Box collection. Small amounts of shredded paper can be placed in your Green Bin or backyard composter. Large amounts of shredded paper can be dropped off at select York Region Waste Depots. For more information, please visit **york.ca/wastedepots**.

- Paint cans containing paint or with lids on
- Pesticide containers
- Plastic pails or jugs greater than 22.5 cm in diameter
- Plastic plant trays larger than 30 cm wide by 30 cm long
- Plastic shopping bags, film, wrap
- Plastic toys
- Pots, pans, glassware, dishes
- Shredded paper
- Styrofoam
- Take-out sandwich wraps (e.g. foil or paper laminates)
- Waxed pop cups

WINTER REMINDERS



- Place waste bins or bags in a visible location at the end of your driveway and **not on the roadway or sidewalk**.
- If there is snow, shovel a small area to place bins. Collection crews will not dig out or climb a snowbank to retrieve recycling bins, garbage containers or bags.
- Frozen items stuck inside bins may not be collected. To prevent freezing, line your Green Bin with newspaper and keep your recyclables in a dry location.
- Stack recycling bins to ensure materials are secure.
- If materials are hit by snow removal equipment or are filled with snow prior to collection, it is the resident's responsibility to clean up the materials.
- If collection services are cancelled due to inclement weather or poor road conditions, the normal practice is to collect the next day.

BULKY ITEM COLLECTION



- Non-metal items such as furniture, mattresses, box springs, plastic lawn furniture, toilets and carpeting are picked up with regular waste collection.
- No special arrangements are needed for bulky items.
- A maximum of five (5) bulky waste items can be placed at the curb on your scheduled garbage collection day. Items over the limit will be tagged and left at the curb.
- All items must be set out for collection **by 7 a.m.**
- Break down or separate large/heavy items and remove toilet tanks from bowls.
- Bundle small pieces and tie carpeting and linoleum into rolls measuring no longer than 1.2 m (4 ft) and weighing less than 22 kg (50 lb).



METAL GOODS AND APPLIANCE COLLECTION




- Large metal items such as appliances, barbecues (excluding propane tanks), bed frames, furnaces, hot water heaters, metal bath tubs and bicycles must be recycled.
- Please call our waste collection contractor, GFL at 1-866-421-5625 to arrange for a special curbside collection. Items will not be picked up unless a date has been scheduled. For details about this program, please see page 18.

Waste, Recycling and Green Bin **Collection Route Map**





Yard waste is collected bi-weekly with recycling from April to December, as part of your regularly scheduled collection.

Yard waste reminders:

- Weeds, plant trimmings, crab apples and leaves must be placed in kraft paper yard bags or a rigid, open-top container that has sturdy handles. No grass clippings, sod or soil allowed in curbside yard waste bags.
- If you are using rigid containers for yard waste, please place a yellow yard waste sticker on the container. Yard waste stickers are free and available at Aurora Town Hall and the Joint Operations Centre.
- Set out your yard waste by 7 a.m. Collection vehicles will not return for late set-outs.
- Maximum weight allowed for yard waste is 22 kg (50 lb).
- In cooler weather, yard waste items can freeze to containers which may cause damage.
- Yard waste in plastic bags, cardboard boxes, Blue Boxes, Green Bins, laundry bins, blue recycling bags and biodegradable bags will not be collected.
- Seasonal décor such as pumpkins, straw and corn stalks are collected as yard waste.

Backyard Composting

Composting produces an excellent soil conditioner that improves the quality of your soil and the plants growing in it. It also reduces your kitchen and yard waste disposal. Backyard composters are available for purchase. See page 13 for more information.



What is Lyme disease?



- Metal items and appliances must be set out by 7 a.m.
- Collection vehicles will only go by once. Vehicles will not return for items that have been set out late.
- Property owners are responsible for cleaning up and disposing of unacceptable items.
- Metal items and appliance collection items do not require a special tag.
- There is no limit for metal goods and appliances.
- Collection of bulky goods does not require a scheduled appointment. You can place up to five (5) bulky items at the curb on your scheduled collection day. Any items over the five (5) item limit will be tagged and left at the curb.


